

Scope & Sequence: *Tales of Wonder & Imagination*

Fairy tales and fables, like any other wisdom story, contain deep messages on how to live an empowered life. When we expose our children to the wisdom in these stories, we are providing for them a road map through life. By exploring the actions, choices and outcomes the characters experienced, our children can gain insight into what is happening in their own lives.

Often the child in the story is left out or abandoned in some way, yet, they are always able to overcome their circumstances through their own innate wisdom and power. It is important for our children to understand this and claim their power.

Children instinctively know that these stories are just stories. They understand that they are not true on a literally level but are examples of the inner challenges we all must face and overcome. Also, we all have experiences that are challenging or frightening. Fairy tales tell the children that these challenging or frightening experiences can be overcome and that they are not powerless. | 6 | “Kindness Makes a Difference” | We are sometimes distracted and don't always take the time to express our gratitude. | “The Elves & the Shoemaker,” <i>The Complete Grimm's Fairy Tales</i> by The Brothers Grimm |
| 7 | “I Have My Own Mind” | Deciding whether to go along with the crowd or express my own thoughts is not always easy. | “The Emperor's New Clothes,” Hans Christian Anderson |
| 8 | “My Words Have Power” | Honesty, while not always easy, is necessary if we want to be thought of as trustworthy. | “The Boy Who Cried Wolf,” <i>Aesop's Fables</i> |
| 9 | “Be Careful What You Promise” | When we are in a jam, we might make promises without thinking about the consequences. | “Rumpelstiltskin,” <i>The Complete Grimm's Fairy Tales</i> by The Brothers Grimm |
